

WILTON

...a GREAT new town or NO town at all













It's not every day that you get to plan a new town from scratch, so the proposal to build a new town at Wilton with an eventual population of up to 50,000 is a unique opportunity to do things right. That's why Wollondilly Council has launched an advocacy campaign involving the release of a paper called "Wilton... a GREAT new town or NO town at all".

The paper expresses the importance of a best-practice and coordinated approach to the planning of the new town at Wilton, to ensure it meets our high expectations.

The advocacy paper was launched with a press conference on 8th June 2017 and has been distributed widely to key stakeholders, particularly the NSW Premier, key Cabinet Ministers, and key government departments. In the wake of the press conference there has been very positive media coverage reinforcing the message and congratulating Council for its proactive stance.

We all know that growth on the fringe of Sydney is unfortunately often characterised by issues such as lagging or non-existent infrastructure, limited employment, lack of services and poor public transport. Our advocacy paper calls on all government agencies and the development industry to work together to make sure the new town at Wilton does not also struggle with these issues. Already we are seeing positive results with commitments from the State Government on a new K-12 public school for Wilton, and with NSW Government staff discussing a feasibility study for the provision of passenger rail services to Wilton.

2016/17 WORKS PROGRAM...WHAT WE ACHIEVED

After 12 months of intense effort involving many staff from across Council and external contractors, Broughton Pass was reopened, on schedule, on Friday 30 June. Despite this major unexpected project, our teams stayed on track and rolled out our largest ever Works Program for the 2016/17 financial year.

Some of the things Council achieved for the community included major roadworks at Bridge Street, Arina Road, Burns Road, Silverdale Road, Remembrance Driveway, Montpelier Drive (Dairy Bend), Menangle Road/Camden Road intersection, Redbank Place, Thirlmere Way and Ridge Road. We also completed kerb and gutter work at Moorlands Road, Marsh Road and York Street and footpath construction at Montpelier Drive and Lumsdaine Street.

We upgraded 10 bus stops and shelters around the Shire, replaced the Stonequarry Creek Bridge handrails, built a roundabout at the Regreme Road/Remembrance Driveway intersection and coordinated the installation of Picton's first set of traffic lights at Margaret Street. Another long term project, the Picton Sportsground pedestrian bridge, is now open for use.

Council completed restorations at the Hume tennis courts and an upgrade at the Tahmoor tennis courts. The Old Picton Post Office was dried out after the storm damage and the long awaited library renovation was finished. We carried out maintenance at the Leisure Centre and commenced the new operation contract. Behind the scenes, we have purchased the land for Bargo RFS and commenced the tender process for its construction. Our outdoor staff have also been on hand to help with events such as IlluminARTe and Winterfest as well as keeping our towns and villages looking neat and tidy during the winter period.

With the new financial year well and truly upon us, many new infrastructure projects are now underway. For more information on Council's current major projects head to our website and search 'infrastructure' then 'current projects'.



LOOKING AFTER THE COMMUNITY'S ROAD ASSETS

Council looks after a large range of assets on behalf of the community including over 830km of roads, 175 buildings, 232ha of parks and reserves, 2 pools, 78km of footpaths, 3 cemeteries, 2 waste facilities and numerous stormwater drainage facilities.

Council's Infrastructure teams are continually working to meet the challenge of maintaining, replacing and upgrading these assets to the standard desired by Council and the community, and within our current budget capacity.

Council's Asset Management Strategy aims to proactively address maintenance and renewals (like for like replacement at the end of planned life) through ongoing reviews of the condition and use of assets, allowing works programs to be prioritised effectively.

Roads are the biggest component of the asset portfolio and are regularly identified by the community as their most important priority. In response, Council assigns the largest portion of the Capital Budget for road works. In 2017/18, \$12.03 million or 71% of the total capital budget of \$16.95 million is allocated to major road and bridge works, including kerb and guttering, footpaths and other traffic facilities. In addition, a significant proportion of the maintenance budget is allocated to smaller scale repair works.

Our approach to managing the roads assets is

the subject of ongoing review and refinement. As a result, we are allocating increasing proportions of the road works budget for earlier interventions through heavy patching and surface resealing as well as other programmed maintenance works such as roadside drainage, to extend the life of the pavements before full reconstruction is required.

There will always need to be full reconstruction and widening of sections of our busiest roads such as Montpelier, Silverdale, Finns and Woodbridge Roads and Remembrance Driveway and we will continue to program these works at the same time as undertaking an increased program of heavy patching and resealing across the Shire.

As the Shire grows, capacity and access issues on our roads are expected to become a bigger issue for the community, including the linkages from Silverdale to Penrith and Liverpool, congestion through Picton, and ageing infrastructure such as Broughton Pass and Douglas Park Drive.

Council will continue with smaller scale initiatives to address these issues within our current budget capacity and seek State and Federal Government funding and developer contributions to deliver the required upgrades in the longer term.

BUILD FOR A CURE IS COMING TO APPIN

Did you know that on average 950 children and adolescents are diagnosed with cancer every year? And 13 of those children are from the Macarthur region?

Children's Cancer Institute is the only medical research institute in Australia that focus solely on childhood cancer – and this year for International Children's Cancer Awareness month, their Build for a Cure fundraiser will be coming to Appin.

The Institute is joining up with McDonald Jones Homes and Walker Corp. to build a house in Appin Place in just 28 days. The house will be built entirely by volunteers, fully-furnished and then auctioned off, with all proceeds going to Children's Cancer Institute's vital research.

Local Appin businesses are also behind the campaign, including DiMez Real Estate who'll be donating their time to sell the house.

Building begins on 21st of August. The community are invited to family fun days on both Reveal Day on 17th of September and Auction Day on 22nd of October hosted by Scott Cam and Damien Cooley from the block.

RATEABLE **LAND VALUATIONS**

Since receiving their 2017/18 rate notice in mid-July, a number of ratepayers have contacted Council concerned that their rates have gone up by more than the 10.8% increase approved by IPART.

The reason for the differing percentage increases this year is due to the new Rateable Land Valuations that have been provided by the Valuer General. A revaluation of all properties in NSW occurred on 1 July 2016 and the 2016 base date rateable valuations have been used as the basis of rating from 1 July 2017. General revaluations may result in the value of some land increasing or decreasing by more than other land. When this occurs the rate burden between individual rate assessments shifts, meaning that rates payable on some land may increase by more than the 10.8% rate cap, while rates on other land may increase by less than

the 10.8% rate cap or even decrease. Council's total rate income cannot however exceed the permitted 10.8% increase. In other words, these new land valuations do not change the overall amount of rates income that Council receives. They do however effect how much individual properties pay relative to other properties.

ROAD CONDITION INSPECTION

We're currently inspecting the Shire's network of roads using specially equipped vehicles that use laser measurement and video recording.

The information helps us to monitor the condition of our roads and prioritise works, so that we can efficiently manage our road assets.

You may see camera equipped inspection vehicles travelling around the Shire. The vehicles are driven by experienced contractors travelling at normal

traffic speeds with hazard lighting and other warning devices in operation. If you're travelling behind one of the vehicles keep at least one car length back to provide the rear cameras with a clear view of the road surface.

Your Privacy

All cameras are focused on the road and kerb surface structure with some limited viewing of areas directly adjacent. No image recordings of commercial or residential, private properties or structures are undertaken.
