

Koala Food trees of the Wollondilly



Koalas primarily feed on species of Eucalyptus. The presence and health of **Koalas** is very much dependent on the species in an area and the types of soils they grow on.

In the Wollondilly we have two main vegetation types which contain these species and soils, **Cumberland Plane Woodland** and **Shale Sandstone Transition Forest**, these are both Endangered Ecological Communities. Koalas will use other neighbouring forest types and riparian areas as corridors to move around.
